**FOCUS AREA:** *Nonprofit capacity and sustainability*  
**GEOGRAPHIC AREA:** *Statewide*

Some community-benefit projects need a place to incubate their ideas without necessarily having to become independent nonprofit organizations. New Mexico Community Foundation has responded to this challenge through our Fiscal Sponsorship Program. We support, champion and provide services to unincorporated nonprofit projects in New Mexico that benefit the community. Fiscal sponsorship allows organizations to concentrate on their charitable purposes while we handle “back office” services and provide a secure, reliable mechanism for donors. We provide a number of support services including financial, grants management, fundraising and gift acknowledgement. We also offer back office support for existing nonprofits. Our current fiscally sponsored projects benefit animals, arts and culture, children, education, environment, health, human services, neighborhoods and communities.

Fiscal sponsorship is an activity by which a public charity, tax-exempt under Section 501C(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, provides financial and programmatic oversight of unincorporated nonprofit projects that allows those fiscally sponsored programs to receive grants and tax-exempt donations from foundations, individuals, and government entities.

Supporting Partnerships to Assure Ready Kids



**IMPACT:** Addressing the achievement gap for young children

**FOCUS AREA:** Children and Education

**GEOGRAPHIC AREA:** Statewide

A child's future academic success is influenced by his or her own readiness for school, as well as the school's readiness to educate the child, and a community's capacity and readiness to support families and children.

## NM Early Learning Plan 2004

Ready children. Ready schools. Ready families. Simply put, these are the goals of the SPARK initiative at work in New Mexico, implemented through the leadership of the New Mexico Community Foundation and the W.K. Kellogg Foundation in six local communities (including the Pueblo of Laguna) from 2004-2009. By finding better ways to communicate and connect, program participants ensured that children made a low-

stress, high-success transition from preschool to kindergarten and elementary school.

It is important that every young child in New Mexico is ready for school. Every child in New Mexico comes to school with diverse strengths rooted in his or her family's unique culture, heritage, language, beliefs, and circumstances. Early learning programs that support the full participation of every child build on these strengths by promoting a sense of belonging, supporting positive social relationships, and enabling families and professionals to gain advocacy skills that positively impact the life of every child.

Research shows effective partnerships between schools, early learning programs, the community, and families can:

### 2010: Sandoval County

New Mexico Community Foundation, with the support of the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, is now working to bring SPARK to more Native American communities in Sandoval County. Results show

that a SPARK model can have a significant impact on school success of Native American children.

Pueblo of Jemez was identified and agreed to partner with NMCF to implement the two year project. In addition, NMCF has offered this model training and technical assistance to other interested schools. This low cost, high impact early childhood transition program builds on the success of Head Start, continuing through the third grade. The SPARK project combines research based information about early learning using locally developed methods for planning and implementing activities. The SPARK model has been field tested in communities around the state.

# GOOD FOOD FOR NEW MEXICO FAMILIES



**IMPACT:** Revitalizing local food production for community health and prosperity

**FOCUS AREA:** Rural Development and Civic Leadership

**GEOGRAPHIC AREA:** Statewide

Agriculture, and the local farm and food systems that support it, are central to the multicultural heritage, culinary history and economic development of New Mexico. At the same time, the lack of equitable access to healthy, locally grown foods has risks for diabetes, heart disease and other diet-related illnesses on the rise.

Good Food for New Mexico Families is a partnership between the New Mexico Acequia Association, the American Friends Service Committee and Farm to Table.

Established in 2009, the program evolved out of the belief that localizing and revitalizing the food system in Hispano, Native American, and rural communities would cultivate more equitable physical and economic health.

In getting “good food” to more individuals and families, the vision is to revitalize agriculture, stimulate rural economies through food production

and distribution, provide greater availability of affordable rural grocery venues, and ensure the long term health of land and water.

NMCF has helped fund Good Food for New Mexico Families since its inception. A \$50,000 matching grant from Convergence Partnership/Innovation Fund of the Tides Foundation, along with grant funds from NMCF, helped to attract matching funds from the McCune Charitable Foundation, PNM Foundation and Albuquerque Community Foundation – for a total of \$150,000.

The funding provided grants that helped implement the Good Food for New Mexico Families project as well as a collaborative initiative, Healthy Food for New Mexico Families.

To date, the following community groups statewide are participating in Healthy Food for New Mexico Families:

For four years, NMCF incubated full service community schools through the Elev8 NM program. Originally funded by Atlantic Philanthropies and the State of New Mexico, Elev8 NM supports five middle schools across three school districts in New Mexico: Albuquerque, Anthony and the Pueblo of Laguna.

Elev8 NM focuses on increasing learning time, engaging families, strengthening community and school connections, and coordinating resources along three core components:

## *Extended Learning*

Extended learning opportunities before and after school programs support academic achievement by offering a diverse choice of relevant, structured

learning activities that are engaging, challenging, and connected to the classroom.

## *Comprehensive School-Based Health*

School-based health centers provide students and families with easily accessible, age-appropriate preventive physical, behavioral, and oral health services, regardless of ability to pay.

## *Family Engagement and Supports*

Family engagement encourages parents to become full partners with the school and increase involvement with their child's education. Based on need, family support services and resources on school campuses are designed to promote economic stability, good health, and continuing education.

**FOCUS AREA:** *Environment and Animals*

**GEOGRAPHIC AREA:** *Statewide*

Every year, thousands of horses are moved through New Mexico on their way to Mexican slaughter houses. An estimated one-half to one-third of calls to animal cruelty hotlines throughout New Mexico are about horses and other equines — including donkeys and mules — that are suffering from neglect and cruelty. In a challenging economy, even well-meaning equine owners who have lost a job or suffered a medical emergency are struggling to feed their animals.

### *Humane Treatment and Compassionate Care*

A lack of humane options for equines in New Mexico has long made these and other cases difficult to remedy. But since 2009, the Equine Protection Fund, a fund of the New Mexico

Community Foundation operated in partnership with Animal Protection of New Mexico, has come to the rescue with financial assistance, collaborative resources and equine know how.

The first equine welfare and education program in New Mexico, the fund was established to collaborate with individuals and organizations to encourage the humane treatment of equines, offer emergency equine resources and compassionate care, and find long term solutions for equine health and protection. Horses and other equines are integral to the heritage of New Mexico and the American West. While the equine crisis in New Mexico is severe, the Equine Protection Fund is doing all it can to buck the trend. 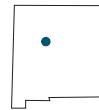

# PUEBLO OF JEMEZ EDUCATION ENDOWMENT



**IMPACT:** Using philanthropy as a tool to bring sustainability for lifelong learning

**FOCUS AREA:** Native American Philanthropy and Entrepreneurship

**GEOGRAPHIC AREA:** Pueblo of Jemez

While Pueblo of Jemez, a non-gaming tribe, has a small scholarship for students, it isn't enough to fund everyone who wishes to attend college. Many college-bound students who apply for scholarships each year are denied, leaving many to resort to high-interest student loans or abandon their college dreams altogether.

These circumstances, as well as others, inspired community vision and the creation of a comprehensive strategic plan. The endowment fund is a major milestone along this path and honors the community's inherent value of reciprocity. Charitable gifts to the endowment create opportunities that last forever.

The Pueblo of Jemez Education Endowment fund was created in partnership with the New Mexico Community Foundation (NMCF), which will manage

its growth of permanent pool of money solely dedicated to educational endeavors at the Pueblo.

In time, interest from the fund will be used to fund scholarships and support education programs. The endowment will also aid educational programs at area schools, such as research that supports use of the tribe’s native Towa language in school curriculum, youth development, and community-based experiential learning opportunities for students.

In 2010, the pueblo approached NMCF with a proposal to raise \$50,000 in one year. Central to their proposal was a challenge to leaders and members to raise funds through individual giving, contributions from businesses, an employee giving program, and other new, innovative approaches to fundraising.

In a fine example of community leadership, the Pueblo’s Health Board and Health Department kicked off the fundraising drive with a \$25,000 initial investment in the fund.

NMCF, with support from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, pledged to match half of the pueblo’s \$50,000 pledge, or \$25,000, when the pueblo reaches its goal. This would launch the endowment fund with a total investment of \$75,000.

By establishing the endowment, the pueblo became the second tribe in New Mexico (after the Pueblo of Laguna) to forge an endowment partnership with NMCF and the 16th tribe in the nation to launch its own endowment.

## *Connecting community, science and environment*

Many people are concerned about air and water quality in their communities. But people who live in the neighboring communities around Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL) have specific concerns about how nearby nuclear operations and waste management activities impact the environment in which they live.

In 2003, a groundbreaking effort by a consortium of government, community and business organizations combined civic engagement and technical stewardship to create RACER (Risk Analysis, Communications, Evaluation, Reduction).

The RACER Project was created to address the absence of an efficient and understandable way to inform the community, regulators and LANL itself, about the presence of radioactive and hazardous materials in the surrounding area. As RACER evolved, it became clear that the project's long term success required its management by an independent organization familiar with the issues affecting

Today, NMCF actively works to promote the principles of transparency and accessibility upon which RACER was founded. We not only manage the technical oversight of the database and Data Analysis Tool, we are actively building community awareness about RACER and the significance of its data to the well being of the people and places of New Mexico. NMCF offers community workshops about its use, while also holding monthly community meetings that promote active public dialogue concerning environmental issues at LANL. Additionally, NMCF has promoted environmental education by supporting the incorporation of RACER into college curriculum and student internships at Northern New Mexico College.

No other US Department of Energy facility or major industry provides RACER's level of data transparency and public accessibility. Currently containing more than nine million analytical results, with ongoing updates from LANL and the State of New Mexico Environment Department, RACER has significantly changed the way communities access and understand environmental data.

# NMCF: MISSION RELATED INVESTING

Mission Related Investing (MRI) is an investment process that considers social and environmental returns in addition to financial ones, and employs various methods to achieve these returns. MRI is individually targeted to an organization's specific mission. MRI is commonly undertaken to actively use investing as a means to further the organization's mission.

Five years ago, New Mexico Community Foundation saw this opportunity with New Mexico Community Capital (NMCC). NMCC's mission is to improve the lives of New Mexicans by investing in small- and mid-sized companies, thereby creating quality jobs and contributing to local community and economic sustainability. Seeking opportunity in New Mexico's rural and underdeveloped areas has been emphasized. This mission is aligned with NMCF's mission of rural and economic development. So in 2005, NMCF invested a portion of its own endowment in NMCC's first Venture Capital Fund.

Over time, the number and quality of jobs created by its companies has consistently increased. Since 2005, total employment at NMCC's financed companies has grown from 14 to 202 as of year-end 2010. Wages paid to NMCC portfolio company employees have grown from \$11.90 in 2005 to \$17.48 as of year-end 2009 (+43%). Every NMCC portfolio company employee receives hourly wages not only above the minimum wage, but also high enough to be considered above his or her county's living wage standards. And although New Mexico has the second highest rate of uninsured adults in the U.S. (25.6%), three quarters of NMCC portfolio company employees are eligible for employer-paid health care.

Clearly, NMCC's work and NMCF's investment is helping to create good, high paying jobs for New Mexicans and improving livelihoods.

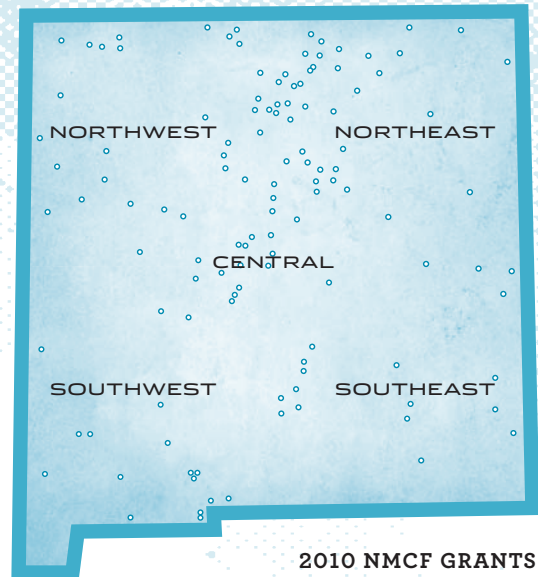
